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

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS AS CONTEXT FOR VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN DATA COLLECTION

Target 5.2.

Eliminate all forms of violence against all women and girls in the public and private spheres including trafficking and sexual and other types of exploitation



Indicators:

- **5.2.1. (“IPV”)** Proportion of ever-partnered women and girls aged 15 years and older subjected to physical, sexual or psychological violence by a current or former intimate partner, in the last 12 months, by form of violence and by age group
- **5.2.2. (“SV”)** Proportion of women and girls aged 15 years and older subjected to sexual violence by persons other than an intimate partner, in the last 12 months, by age group and place of occurrence

HOW IS VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN MEASURED?

Physical violence

e.g. slapping, pushing, biting, hair pulling, kicking, throwing things, choking, burning, using or threatening to use a weapon such as a gun or knife


Sexual violence

e.g. forced/coerced intercourse, intercourse out of fear, degrading or humiliating sex

Psychological violence

e.g. prevented from seeing friends and/or family, insisting on knowing where she is at all times, verbal insults, making her feel scared or intimidated

5.2.1. Intimate partner violence

UNDERSTANDING PREVALENCE DATA: KEY TAKEAWAYS FOR SDG MONITORING

What is the story?

- Overall prevalence rates hide huge variations
- Similar prevalence rates are misleading as they ignores severity, frequency
- Prevalence of physical and/or sexual violence hides differences in levels of ‘gendered’ violence
- Comparing lifetime with current explains part of the dynamics
- The most severe cases and forms will never be captured
- Context is key



VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN PREVALENCE DATA: KEY TAKEAWAYS

Other challenges for SDG monitoring:

- Lack of data
- Issues with comparability
- Capturing the voices of the most vulnerable
- Limited national and regional capacity
